Pearl High boys track and field team named State Champs

The Pearl High School boys track and field team was recently named the MH-SAA 6A State Champs following the championship event, which was held at Pearl High School. Coach Chris Barnett celebrated with the team on winning their 16th state championship and the first back-to-back championship since 2012, when the boys won three in a row. Barnett received the honor of being named the 2019 National High School Athletic Coaches Association Boys Track and Field Coach of the Year for Mississippi.

During the 2018-19 season, the team won the Saltillo Cross Country Invitational, Clinton Cross Country Invitational, Jesse Owens Classic (fourth year consecutive), and the Rankin County

David Adams, Patrick Spurgeon and JiKori James, from the boys' team, and Shana Sellers, from the girls' team, were selected for the *Clarion Ledger* Cross Country All-State Teams.

The girls team finished as runners up at the state championships.

The Woody Barnett Track and Field Complex, home of the Pearl Track and Field Team, was built in 2003 and hosted its first meet in 2004. The Woody Barnett Complex has hosted college meets and many junior high and high school meets, including USA Track & Field, invitationals, Little 6 Championships, divisions, regionals, and the MH-SAA State Championship. The state championship win is the 54th overall for the Pearl High School Track and Field and Cross Country programs.

City of Pearl seeking citizen input for comprehensive plan



In order to assist CMPDD planners and City leaders in developing the plan, the City is asking citizens to complete a brief online survey. City leaders say the community's input and comments will be a valuable part of the process.

The CMPDD planning staff has extensive experience providing comprehensive planning assistance or strategic long-range planning guidance to communities. Comprehensive plans help communities define their course for the future. Long-range planning efforts examine issues of growth in a community and provide policy recommendations to address development pressures as a community changes from rural to more

urban land uses. The heart of a comprehensive plan includes a series of recommended growth management strategies in the areas of land use, transportation, economic development and community facilities.

As with any long-range planning document, a comprehensive plan is intended to be an evolving document that is revised as poli-

cies and economic conditions change. Comprehensive plans are also intended to serve as a stepping stone to the development of other policy documents, such as zoning ordinances, subdivision regulations and capital improvement plans, as well as supplemental regulations such as sign, landscaping and parking ordinances.

The CMPDD is the only planning and development district in Mississippi which has a staff of AICP certified planners. As a result, the District continues to provide comprehensive planning and other assistance to local communities throughout the region and state.

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FLO-TOWN USA splash pad open for summer

The City of Florence splash pad, FLO-TOWN USA, opened for the season on June 1.

Daily admission, required for all who enter the splash pad, ages one and up, is \$5 per person. A family day pass, for a family of up to four, is available for \$17.

Season passes are available for \$50 for an individual, \$125 for a family of up to four. Additional family members can be added to the family pass for \$20 per person.

Shady pavilions beside the playground and splash pad are ideal for birthday parties or picnics. Two hours of two picnic tables in the covered pavilion is \$85 and includes armbands for twenty guests during regular splash pad hours. Additional guests are \$4 each.

FLO-TOWN USA may be booked for a party or large group between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m., Monday through Saturday. During regular business hours, the use of two picnic tables in the pavilion is guaranteed, but there may be other customers on the splash pad.

After-hours private parties may be scheduled from 6 p.m. until 8 p.m. Monday through Saturday, or Sunday afternoons from 1 until 3 p.m. or 3 until 5 p.m. The rate of \$170 includes exclusive use of the pavilion, all tables and the splash pad, with armbands for forty guests.

No reservations may be made without



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full payment. Payments may be made by cash, check or money order made payable to the City of Florence. Debit and credit cards, with a small processing fee, are also accepted. All reservations must be made at City Hall.

B&P Family Farms aiming for long-term impact

Hunters, outdoorsmen and wildlife conservationists in Southwest Rankin County wanting to improve their hunting and the overall quality of their land can find the products and services they need right in Florence. B&P Family Farms is a family-owned and operated wildlife tree nursery and habitat improvement company, specializing in growing fruit and nut-bearing trees that are a beneficial food resource for wildlife. Started in 2011 by longtime friends and Florence residents Tyler Bishop and Jonathan Patterson, B&P Family Farms strives for conservation through education.

"Our customers are land owners and hunters that want their hunting to be better, but we know that ultimately what we're doing is conservation work and not just selling a product," says

Patterson. "We really try to educate our customers on what we're doing and the long-term impact of our services."

And those services go well beyond growing and selling trees and other plants beneficial to wildlife. B&P provides complete consultation for the actual habitat their trees and plants will be placed in, starting with research on the predominant species historically found in the area. They use a mobile lab to run soil tests on site, and then it's a matter

of determining how many trees per acre will be planted. They also make recommendations on thinning and timber harvesting, perform controlled burns, trap predators, and remove invasive plant species such as kudzu, bradford pear, and Japanese climbing fern.

"On recreational property or hunting land, we pretty much do anything that anybody would need us to do, all the way down to grading out and building roads and replacing culverts," Patterson says.

Since the company's inception eight years ago, B&P's business and plant nursery have grown tremendously. To date, they have worked on 218 different pieces of private property all across the state of Mississippi, as well as two locations in Arkansas, ranging in size from twenty to 3,000 acres. Two current Mississippi State University students are on track to join Bishop and Patterson next

May, bringing a biologist and registered forester into the fold. With hunting being a major industry and pastime in Mississippi, the demand for wildlife benefiting trees and plants is ever increasing. Eventually, Patterson hopes their conservation efforts will move beyond the private sector.

"Our goal is to partner with state entities and large non-profit conservation groups to hopefully get into doing more large-scale work on public lands to have some long-term impact there. For me, personally, it's a legacy that I don't care either way if my name is attached to. If we're able to change any number of acres back to a natural healthy ecosystem that's there a hundred years after I'm gone, then I've succeeded."

MDOT work continues in Rankin County

Mississippi Transportation Commissioner Dick Hall has announced updates to Mississippi Department of Transportation (MDOT) projects in central Mississippi.

"The focus of the majority of the projects in central Mississippi is safety or system preservation," Hall said. "Because of shortfalls in current transportation funding, the majority of MDOT's projects reflect the agency's continued shift from capacity upgrades to system preservation and maintenance."

The U.S. Highway 49 Safety Improvement Project in Rankin County is currently on schedule for a summer 2021 completion.

W.G. Yates & Sons Construction Company, of Philadelphia, was awarded the approximately \$147 million construction contract in November 2017.

Traffic has been moved to the inside completed Phase I work in the median. The traffic shift was necessary for crews to safely begin work on Phase II, which includes bridge work, new drainage structure installation and outside lane widening. Median crossovers throughout the project limits have been closed to the traveling public for safety

reasons

Once Phase II is complete, traffic will be shifted back to the outside for Phase III to begin. In Phase III, the existing concrete pavement and median will be removed. Some Phase III work has started north of Lyle Machinery.



Phase IV will include final paving and striping on the project.

Also in Rankin County, Dickerson & Bowen, Inc. will soon begin an approximately two-mile mill and overlay project on State Route 475 from State Route 468 to I-20. The approximately \$837,000 project will also upgrade the traffic signal at Allen Stuart Drive.



Pearl Jr. High receives grant to expand STEM program

Pearl Junior High School was one of only fifteen schools in Mississippi selected to share more than \$896,000 in grants to establish or enhance programs in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) in kindergarten through eighth grade.

Earlier this year, the Mississippi State Board of Education (SBE) awarded funding for the K-8 STEM Initiative Enhancement Project Grant to support implementation of STEM activities in classrooms and coursework, while providing technology upgrades and educator training to implement STEM applications. Priority was given to schools implementing engineering, computer science, ro-

botics, and other project-based STEM activities to expand the current Mississippi College and Career Readiness Standards for math and/or science K-8

"These grants will help schools increase opportunities for students to explore STEM education in elementary and middle school so they will be better prepared for STEM courses in high school," said Dr. Nathan Oakley, chief academic officer. "STEM-related professions are growing, and there is an increasing demand for high school and college graduates with expertise in science, technology, engineering and mathematics."

Districts and schools were selected to receive the grant through a competitive request for application process.

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

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
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Hinds Phi Theta Kappa chapters win honors

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



MDE partnership to award 125 teacher scholarships

The Mississippi Department of Education (MDE) is partnering with Mississippi Professional Educators (MPE) to award scholarships to up to 125 diverse candidates who wish to pursue their National Board Certification. Awardees will each receive a \$475 scholarship. Diversity may be based on an educator's race, gender, ethnicity, subject(s) taught or pathway to licensure.

The scholarship opportunity is made possible through a grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, which also supports the Mississippi Teacher Residency program.

The scholarship will provide seed money for recipients to begin their National Board journey. Scholarship recipients will use the state's reimbursement of their initial component to pay for subsequent components.

Scholarship recipients will also be reimbursed for the \$75 registration fee to the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards and will receive up to \$100 for mentoring support at a World Class Teaching Program.


Ninety-five scholarships will be awarded to the highest-ranked applicants teaching in Sunflower County, Jackson Public Schools, Moss Point and Ocean Springs school districts. The remaining thirty scholarships will be awarded to the highest-ranked applicants from the state at large.

To be eligible to apply, applicants must:

- Be under contract as a full-time educator in Mississippi during the 2019-20 school year,
- Hold a bachelor's degree and a valid Mississippi teaching license,
- Have three years of classroom experience.
- Submit the \$75 nonrefundable and nontransferable registration fee to the National Board of Professional Teaching Standards and have a valid candidate identification number,
- Register with a Mississippi World Class Teaching Program by October 30, 2019 and adhere to all program guidelines, and
- Be a first-time National Board candidate who is pursuing the initial component

The application is available at the MPE website. Completed applications are due to the MPE office by 4:30 pm on Friday, August 23.


