### Westbrook named Pearl Police Officer and Patrolman of the Year

Pearl Police Department Officer of 2018 is Officer Glen Westbrook. Westbrook graduated from Madison Central Academy and later began working at the Rankin County jail. He graduated from MLEOTA in 2010 and went to work for the Brandon Police Department (PD). He was hired by Pearl PD in 2016, and currently works a burglary suppression unit on patrol and also on the SWAT team.

"The reason I got into law enforcement was to try to make a difference in the community," said Westbrook. "I began my law enforcement career in 2009, and I have been employed by Pearl for almost three years. The best part of my job is when someone that I have previously arrested approaches me and tells me how they have turned

their life around since the arrest."

"Receiving both Officer of the Year and Patrolman of the Year is very humbling. It is an honor in itself to know that I am respected by my peers. I appreciate this recognition for my dedication and commitment to my job. I am genuinely thankful for my shift because in this profession, we rely on each other to ensure the job is done and everyone goes home to their family," he

Lieutenant Brian McGairty said this about Westbrook, "Officer Westbrook's enhanced training, precision skills, and quick thinking ended a potential threat not just to himself but as well as to the many motorists that were traveling Interstate 20 at the time of the 2018 incident, as well as residential areas parallel with I-20. This incident could very well be an obituary, but instead an officer went back to his shift, a community was kept safe, and a daddy and husband went home to his wife and four children. We are grateful and appreciative for Officer Glen Westbrook. Police Chief Dean Scott said, "Glen does an excellent job, going the extra mile to keep the citizens of Pearl safe. He loves his job and makes my job easier by being what the citizens want out of a police officer."



## **D-BAT opens in Pearl**

Pearl Fire Chief Brad Thornton and Battalion Chief Donnie Boykin opened the only Mississippi franchise of D-Bat in Pearl in February. They offer memberships and special events like Date Night for February 14 and 15 for a Valentine's Day parents' night-out.

Pearl Fire Chief Brad Thornton and Battalion Chief Donnie Boykin have opened a franchise of D-BAT, a baseball and softball training facility, in Pearl across the highway from Park Place Baptist Church. It is the only D-BAT location in Mississippi.

D-BAT originally meant "Dallas baseball" where the franchise started, but has been revised to mean "developing beliefs, attitudes, and traditions." There are 70 other D-BAT locations around the country, including Monroe and Shreveport, Louisiana.

Thornton, a Pearl native, and Boykin, from Florence, have been friends since they joined the Pearl Fire Department on the same day 25 years ago. Both have children who play baseball and softball, so Thornton found out about the franchise opportunity, and they officially opened their doors around the first of February.

"We have hand-picked instructors that are the best in the area," said Boykin. "They offer private lesson on hitting, pitching, fielding and catching."

D-BAT instructors include Jordan Herring, softball pitching instructor; Bry Castro, softball instructor; Dani Craft, softball instructor; Quinton Robertson, pitching instructor; Kevin Griffin, baseball and softball instructor; Will Costinett, baseball instructor; and JG Miley, hitting and fielding;

They have renovated the Fads & Frames location into batting cage, and

turfed fields for instruction and automated pitching machines. They have computer programs that allow members to choose any MLB field where the pitching machines can throw out a curve ball, slow pitch or anything else. It captures analytics for the players' files.

The D-BAT team is comprised of the two owners as well as eight instructors and six part-timers. Even before officially opening, the facility has had packed houses getting ready for the 2019 season. In addition to private baseball and softball lessons, they offer pitching machines with real baseballs and softballs, a fully-stocked pro shop, and over 50 camps and clinics. They also offer a membership program with discounts on lessons, camps and clinics, cage rentals, and pro shop merchandise, along with the option of being able to use the pitching machines for free every day.

Boykin and his wife, Kelly, have two children, Breley, a senior at Jackson Prep who has signed to play softball at the University of Southern Mississippi starting this summer; and Keaton, an eighth grader at Park Place Christian Academy who plays both baseball and football. Thornton and his wife, Angie, also have two children who play. Nick is a ninth grader at Brandon who plays soccer and baseball, and Katie is at Brandon Elementary School and she plays volleyball.

D-BAT is open Monday-Friday, 10-9, Saturday, 10-6, and Sunday, 1-6. For more information, call 601-706-3228.






While working in South Rankin Coun-

## Hinds standout Hodge played in Super Bowl

Former Hinds Eagle football standout and current wide receiver for the Los Angeles Rams, KhaDarel Hodge (D'Lo) made his Super Bowl debut Sunday, February 3, when the Rams took on the New England Patriots in Super Bowl LIII.

Hodge makes his first Super Bowl appearance in his rookie campaign following a regular season where his Rams went 11-3 overall to earn a first-place seed and a buy in the NFL Playoffs. The Rams went on to have a perfect 2-0 in the playoffs defeating the Dallas Cowboys (30-22) and the New

Orleans Saints (26-23). This marks the first time the Rams have reached the Super Bowl since 2002, when they also took on the Patriots.

Hodge played one season at Hinds (2014), where he made the transition from quarterback to wide receiver. From Hinds, Hodge transferred to Prairie View A&M where he started for three seasons and racked up 104 receptions, 1,797 yards and 21 touchdowns in 30 games played. As a senior in 2017, Hodge earned first-team All-SWAC honors. Hodge was signed on July 24, 2018, by the Los Angeles Rams and is currently on their playoff roster at wide receiver.
